Investment objective

The Maestro Equity Fund will be a general equity portfolio. The Manager in selecting securities for the portfolio will seek to follow an investment policy which will secure for investors an optimum overall return, that is to say the steady growth of income and the preservation of capital in real terms. In order to achieve these main objectives the investments to be acquired for the Maestro Equity Fund, shall comprise a mix of securities, financially sound ordinary shares, stock, financially sound preference shares, debenture stock, debenture bonds and unsecured notes as defined in the Act and the Deed, all to be acquired at a fair market value.

The Fund benchmark

The Fund will measure itself against the FTSE-JSE All Share Index. ASISA Classification: South African-Equity-General.

Legal structure

The Fund is a scheme in the nature of a trust known as a collective investment scheme. The portfolio manager is Maestro Investment Management (Pty) Ltd, an approved Financial Services Provider in terms of the Financial Advisory and Intermediary Services Act, operating under license number 739. This portfolio operates as a white label fund under the Prescient unit Trust Scheme, which is governed by the Collective Investment Schemes Control Act.

Fee structure

The maximum initial fee is 2.0%. The annual investment management fee is 1.75%. The annual total expense ratio (TER) for period ended 31 December 2019, in respect of class A was 2.42%.

Market Overview

The behaviour of global equity markets during May is easy to brush aside on the basis that it was "just another strong month". Yet consider the following: the world remains in the throes of a global health pandemic that is far from over; a pandemic which has wrought economic destruction and devastation on an unimaginable scale – most of which is yet to be seen.

The MSCI World index rose 4.6% and the Emerging Market index 0.6%. Within the developed markets, the US rose 4.7%, Germany's Dax index rose 6.7%, and Japan's Nikkei rose 8.3%. Within emerging markets, the Brazilian and Russian markets rose 8.5% and 8.4% respectively, which is ironic for in these two countries the Covid pandemic is still largely out of control. The S&P Mid and Small cap indices rose 7.1% and 4.2% respectively, indicative of the increasing appetite for risk that characterized market behaviour during the month.

The dollar declined slightly (0.7%) during May, which together with hopes of an economic recovery – somewhere, sometime – supported commodity prices. The oil price rose 38.4% but is still down 43.7% during the past year. The price of copper rose 3.5%, iron ore rose 20.2% to above the \$100 mark again and the coal price rose 22.8%. On the currency front, most emerging market currencies were firmer. Within global bond markets, the returns were positive but modest, following their strong gains during April. The Bloomberg Aggregate Global Bond index rose 0.4%, bringing its annual gain for the year to 2.1%; the MSCI World index is down 8.9% during the past year.

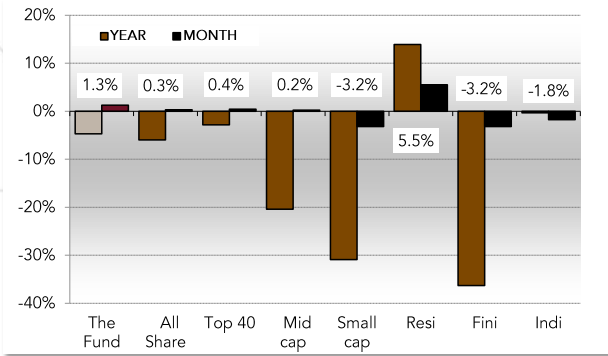

Local market returns

Turning to the South African market, it rose only 0.3%, but was dragged down by the Financial index (-3.2%) and the Industrial index (-1.8%). The Basic Materials index rose 5.5%, boosted by expectations of a global economic recovery, a weaker dollar, and a very low base. The Mid and Small cap indices ended the month up 0.2% and down 3.2% respectively. The rand firmed 4.2% against the dollar, and this, together with the relative attraction of South Africa's high yields (interest rates) in a zero interest rate environment, had a positive impact on the bond market. The All Bond index rose 7.1% although its annual return to end-May is only 1.6%.

Investment manager comment

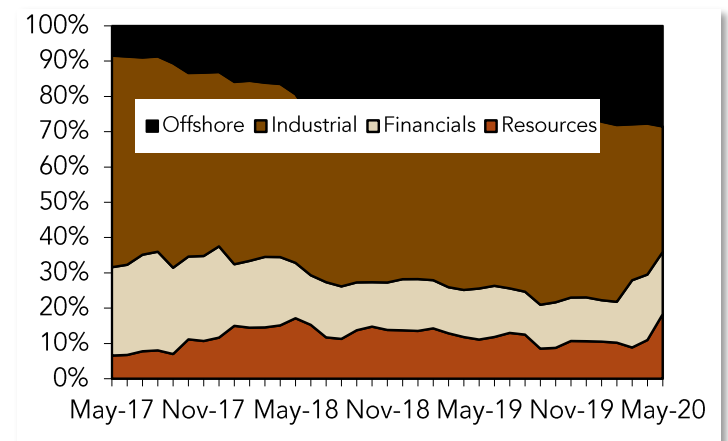
The return on the Fund was 1.3% for the month versus the 0.3% All Share index return. Shares which disappointed during the month included Cashbuild, which lost 20.9%, Capitec lost 6.2% and Naspers 3.8%. Shares that rose during the month included Billiton, which rose 10.8%, MTN 10.9%, Ninety One 13.4%, Transaction Capital 13.4%, Afrimat 19.8% and Aspen 20.8%.

During the month we sold our holdings in Mr Price, Stadio, KAP and AdaptIT.

Historic sector allocation (% of Equity)



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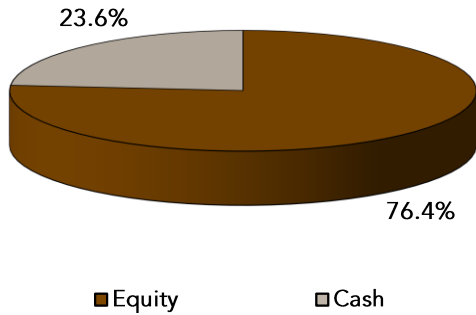
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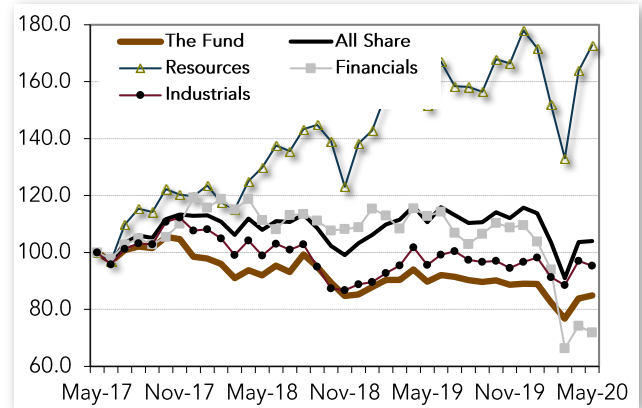
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Asset allocation (% of Fund)
